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1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to Nova Scotia in 2006-07

- In 2006-07, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling close to \$3.9 million to the arts in Nova Scotia.
- In addition to grants, \$233,332 in payments was provided to 575 authors through the Public Lending Right Program in 2006-07.¹ This brings the total amount of Canada Council funding to Nova Scotia to close to \$4.1 million.
- The Canada Council awarded \$617,375 in grants to 68 artists and \$3.2 million to 65 Nova Scotia arts organizations in 2006-07.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in Nova Scotia in each artistic discipline –
 dance, music, theatre, visual arts, media arts, interdisciplinary and performance art and writing and
 publishing. In 2006-07, the largest amount of funding went to music (\$928,000), followed by
 theatre (\$814,950) and visual arts (\$737,045).
- 464 applications from Nova Scotia artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2006-07, representing 3.0% of the total number of received applications.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Halifax totaled \$2.6 million, comprising 67.9% of the total funding going to the province. Dartmouth received \$229,047 in funding, representing 5.9% of total funding and Windsor received \$140,000 (3.6%). 41 additional communities in Nova Scotia received 22.5% of the province's funding for a total of \$866,667.
- In 2006-07, Nova Scotia artists received 2.9% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Nova Scotia arts organizations received 2.7% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Nova Scotia artists and arts organizations received 2.7% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the province makes up 2.9% of the Canadian population,² and 2.7% of Canadian artists.³
- As a result of the increase to the Canada Council's parliamentary appropriation (for the fiscal years 2006-07 and 2007-08) announced in the federal budget of May 2006, 20 arts organizations in Nova Scotia received \$802,167 over a two year period as part of the Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative.
- 53 Nova Scotia artists and arts professionals served as peer assessors in 2006-07, making up 6.8% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Nova Scotia⁴

- In Nova Scotia, 57% of the province's 3,500 artists reside in Halifax (1,990).
- Among the five large cities in the Atlantic provinces (St. John's, Halifax, Moncton, Saint John and Cape Breton), Halifax is the second highest with an artistic concentration of 1.0% (tenth among large Canadian cities).
- Between 1991 and 2001, there was very significant growth in the arts in Halifax (34%).
- Between 1991 and 2001, the arts labour force in Halifax grew at a rate that was over four times higher than growth in the overall local labour force.
- In Halifax, artists have the average earnings of \$20,300, 34% lower than average earnings in the
 overall local labour force. Artists' average earnings and the earnings gap lag behind the national
 averages: average earnings of \$23,500 and an earnings gap of 26%.
- Nova Scotians spent "\$670 million on cultural goods and services in 2005. This amounts to 3.3% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$670 million in consumer spending on culture is over three times larger than the \$210 million spent on culture in Nova Scotia by all levels of government in 2003/04. On a per capita basis, Nova Scotians' cultural spending is sixth-highest among Canadian provinces at \$758 per resident."5

Examples of Canada Council funding in Nova Scotia⁶

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Nova Scotia.

First-time applicant and recipient **Deep Roots Music Co-Operative**, located in Wolfville, received **\$10,000** from the **Music Festivals Programming Project Grants** program to present **Women and Their Roots Project**, a multi-cultural collaborative program within the 2006 Deep Roots Music Festival. Together **Mary-Jane Lamond**, **Shauntay Grant**, **We'koqma'q Qewiskwa'q**, **Sara** and **Kamila Nasr** and **Georgette Leblanc** created a collaborative piece that served as the official opening of the festival. Individual and group presentations throughout the conference "offered a women's perspective on our multi-cultural mosaic and our shared Mi'kmaq, Acadian, Celtic and African Nova-Scotian heritage."

In 2006-07 Sackville's **Debut Atlantic Society** received a grant of **\$40,000** through the **Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative** to increase its visibility and public profile. Through the production of a multi-purpose video presentation and the development and implementation of an enlarged and focused print ad campaign **Debut Atlantic** will promote the presentation of professional Canadian chamber and recital music performances in the Atlantic Provinces. Founded in 1979, **Debut Atlantic** is one of Canada's most dynamic and prestigious arts touring organizations offering exceptional musicians, presenters and audiences with the opportunity for development and growth.

Maureen Hull of Pictou Island received \$20,000 through the Grants to Professional Writers - Creative Writing program to complete a collection of short stories tentatively titled *The Montreal Aunts, and other Stories*. Six stories from the series have already been written, including *Mac and Bessie*, *Sunday Drive* and *Montreal Aunts*. Hull will create nine new stories by December 2007 to be compiled in her second short story collection. Of her first short story collection entitled *Righteous Living* author and critic Margo Wheaton wrote: "a gleaming, carefully-polished gem...Hull's writing is redemptive and, ultimately, purifying."

Susanne Chui of Lower Sackville was awarded her first grant in the amount of **\$600** by the Council's **Travel Grants to Dance Professionals** program to present **BLINDSIDED** at ROMP! A Festival of Independent Dance in Victoria from October 13 to 16, 2006. **Chui** will perform with **S.I.N.S**, a dance collective which she co-founded with **Sara Coffin** and **Jacinte Armstrong**. The performance and collective were introduced as follows: "**BLINDSIDED** investigates the loss of one's senses and the loss of one's sense of self. This trio [S.I.N.S] interprets virtual and conceptual blindness and deafness, within the possible intersections and impasses of life."

In 2006-07 **Amy Jones** of Halifax received her first award from the Canada Council of as the **\$6,000** first prize winner of the **CBC Literary Awards** for her piece entitled **The People Who Love Her**. The CBC jury's comments read as follows: "A vivid, piercing story about friendship, substance abuse, obsessive relationships, and the lacerating damage wrought when there is too much love, or not enough. Here is a story shot through with bright wisdom, striking imagery and a compelling emotional complexity. Here are authentic, unexpected, brave and broken characters masterfully rendered and winningly demanding of our compassion."⁸

Dalhousie Art Gallery, located in Halifax, received \$7,300 from the **Acquisition Assistance for Art Museums and Public Galleries** program to acquire seven new works in 2006-07. The acquisitions include three works by **Jordan Broadworth** entitled *Fray (2005), Untitled (2005) and Crush (2001)*, one work by **Suzanne Gauthier** entitled *Two Horses*, one work by **Janice Leonard** entitled *Paradise* (2005), and two works by **Mathew Reichertz** entitled *Untitled #41* (2005) and *Untitled #42*. Given the ties of these artists to the Atlantic Region of Canada, their works will complement the Gallery's existing collection and fit appropriately into its collecting mandate, which is to acquire works of Canadian origin.

First-time grant recipient **Joel Zemel** of Halifax received **\$12,000** from the **Grants to Film and Video Artists** program to develop a medium-length docudrama video script entitled *A Fiddler's Refrain: The Legacy of James Barrie*. The story will focus on the life of James Barrie (1819-1906) a virtuoso fiddler, artist, farmer, mill owner, teacher and printer. **Zemel** will consult the personal diaries of James Barrie to write a historically accurate script in which Barrie looks back on his life from a "modern" 19th century perspective. Music will be an integral part of the story, as **Zemel** wishes to highlight Barrie's outstanding musical abilities and unique contribution to the musical history of Nova Scotia.

The **Assistance to Aboriginal Traditional Visual Arts Forms** program awarded a **\$3,100** grant to Truro's **Glooscap Heritage Centre** to create **The Glooscap Artist Program** in 2006-07. A first-time grant applicant and recipient the Centre will communicate Mi'kmaq culture and artwork to the communities surrounding Millbrook First Nation through a series of bi-weekly workshops over a sixmonth period. The workshops will be facilitated by Mi'kmaq artists working in various disciplines including beading, filmmaking, wood carving, painting, writing and drum making. Each workshop will have 10 participants, allowing for one-on-one instruction from the artists.

Halifax's **Word Iz Bond Spoken Word Artists' Collective** received a **\$4,000** grant through the **Spoken Word and Storytelling Program** for the **Word Iz Bond's SPEAK! Spoken Word Series** from September 2006 to September 2007. The objective of **SPEAK!** is to "provide opportunities for Canadian spoken word artists to visit Halifax and share their talents with our enthusiastic audience, as well as introduce our local audience to some of the key players on the Canadian spoken word scene." Guest artists include Ardath Wynacht and iZrEAL (Reed Jones) from Halifax, Spin and D-bi Young from Toronto, and Matt Peake from Ottawa.

Maral Perk of Halifax received a grant of **\$3,000** from the **Music Section** to undergo five weeks of flamenco vocal training at the Fundación Cristina Heeren de Arte Flamenco (Cristina Heeren Flamenco Foundation) in Seville, Spain from April 25 to May 29, 2007. During this period of intensive study **Perk** will built upon her abilities as a flamenco performer with Esperanza Fernandez and Calixto Sanchez, both experienced teachers and hailed vocalists. **Perk** also took part in dance classes to aid in her abilities as a singer for dance accompaniment, which requires "particular knowledge of the structure of danced pieces and the rhythmic needs of a dancer."

A **Production Project Grants in Dance** in the amount of **\$8,000** was awarded to **Sheilagh Hunt** of Halifax in 2006-07 to produce and present **Choreographies Never Danced - Dances Never Choreographed**, a dance performance and exhibition. **Hunt**, a first-time grant recipient, will mount a "retrospective of the work of a fictional dance artist – a forgotten and overlooked pioneer of contemporary dance in Atlantic Canada – whose works have only recently been discovered." Through this work **Hunt** wishes to pose serious questions pertaining to the nature of art and its actualization as well as explore the ephemeral nature of dance and its practitioners.

First-time grant recipient **Aube Giroux** of Kings-Hants received a **\$500** from the **Travel Grants to Media Artists** program to participate in the Canadian Screen Training Centre's *Filmmaking with a Purpose* workshop in Ottawa from May 31 to June 4, 2006. During the five-day intermediate/advanced workshop facilitated by Peter Meyboom, **Giroux** was able to increase her knowledge of the process of producing a film, learn new approaches to documentary film including structure and narrative, and explore alternative modes of distribution. **Giroux** wrote that the workshop gave her a boost of confidence that has allowed her to focus on new film projects.

The Artists and Community Collaboration Program awarded Chester Playhouse in Dartmouth a \$5,500 grant to assist with the costs of development for *Home Away From* in 2006-07. *Home Away From* is a dramatic work that explores the nature of 'home' and conflict with the Lebanese-Canadian community. The work will be "nurtured from the voices of the Lebanese community on Nova Scotia's South Shore and delivered through storytelling and reality." The project was initiated by actor, singer and musician *Insof Hammond*, a well-known member of the Lebanese-Canadian community who felt the need to help raise awareness about the issues facing this particular community in Nova Scotia.

Live Art Productions Society received **\$350** from the **Audience and Market Development Travel Grants** program to attend the Festival of New Dance in St. John's from June 21 to 25, 2006. Based in Halifax, **Live Art** is "the only dance presenter in Atlantic Canada to program an annual contemporary dance series featuring national and international calibre artists." Gary Hauser, the General Manager of **Live Art**, saw several performances including works by Deborah Dunn and Martha Carter, who were being considered for presentation in **Live Art**'s upcoming seasons. Hauser wrote: "Newfoundland presents some unique challenges for dance artists; I believe that Live Art can help with the connection to the mainland."

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in Nova Scotia by all three levels of government⁹

- Arts and culture funding to Nova Scotia from all three levels of government stood at \$209.2 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Federal funding made up the largest share at 56% (\$117.4 million) with 27% (\$57.0 million) coming from provincial sources. The remaining 17% (\$34.8 million) was allocated by municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to Nova Scotia totalling \$117.4 million is primarily concentrated (91%) in three areas heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks), broadcasting and film and video. The remaining 9% is allocated to areas including performing arts (\$5.4 million), multidisciplinary arts (\$1.8 million) and literary arts (\$1.7 million). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for about 3.6% of all federal culture spending in Nova Scotia.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in Nova Scotia increased substantially from \$89 million in 1999-00 to \$117.4 million in 2003-04 (an increase of 31.5%). During the same period, Canada Council funding to Nova Scotia increased from \$3.6 million to \$4.2 million.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in two areas libraries and heritage resources (78% or \$44 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to arts education (\$4.6 million), film and video (\$3.2 million), performing arts (\$2.9 million) and other (\$1.1 million).

5.0 Detailed tables of Canada Council funding to Nova Scotia

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Nova Scotia

- Canada Council funding to Nova Scotia increased, rising from \$3.6 million in 1999-00 to \$3.9 million in 2006-07 (an increase of 6.23%). After two years of consecutive decreases in 2004-05 to 2005-06, funding to Nova Scotia increased 13.06% in 2006-07 compared to funding in 2005-06.
- Grants to Nova Scotia as a percentage of total Canada Council funding has been falling over the past eight fiscal years, ranging from 3.52% in 1999-00 to 2.74% in 2006-07.

Grant applications from Nova Scotia

- There was a decrease of 7.01% in the number of grant applications from Nova Scotia artists and arts organizations in the past eight years while the Canada Council as a whole has seen an increase of 4.85%.
- Nova Scotia's share of grant applications in 2006-07 remains stable at 2.96% of total Canada Council grant applications, a share above both its share of population (2.89%) and share of artists (2.70%) see Table 7.

Nova Scotia ranks seventh in terms of its level of Canada Council funding on a per capita basis per
province at \$4.22. In terms of its share of funding, Nova Scotia is in sixth place. Its share of
funding is lower than its share of applications and slightly lower than the province's percentage
share of population, but is a little higher than its percentage share of artists.
