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1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to Saskatchewan in 2006-07

- In 2006-2007, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling close to \$3.3 million to the arts in Saskatchewan.
- In addition to grants, \$166,495 in payments was provided to 287 authors through the Public Lending Right Program in 2006-07.¹ This brings the total amount of funding to Saskatchewan to over \$3.4 million.
- The Canada Council awarded \$391,942 in grants to 43 artists and over \$2.9 million to 49 Saskatchewan arts organizations in 2006-07.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in Saskatchewan in dance, media arts, music, theatre, visual arts, writing and publishing and interdisciplinary arts. In 2006-07, the largest amount of funding went to visual arts (\$949,250). Theatre received the second largest amount of funding (\$655,635), followed by media arts (\$454,792).
- 310 applications from Saskatchewan artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2006-07, representing 2.0% of the total number of received applications.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Regina totaled \$1.5 million, comprising 45% of the total funding going to Saskatchewan. Saskatoon also received \$1.5 million in funds, representing 45% of total funding. A total of 15 additional communities in Saskatchewan received \$325,700, or 10% of all funding to the province in 2006-07.
- In 2006-2007, Saskatchewan artists received 1.9% of Canada Council funding to artists and Saskatchewan arts organizations received 2.4% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Saskatchewan artists and arts organizations received 2.3% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the province makes up 2.3% of artists,² and 3.1% of the Canadian population.³
- As a result of the increase to the Canada Council's parliamentary appropriation (for the fiscal years 2006-07 and 2007-08) announced in the federal budget of May 2006, 19 arts organizations in Saskatchewan received \$495,000 over a two year period as part of the Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative.
- 31 Saskatchewan artists and arts professionals served as peer assessors in 2006-07, making up 4% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Saskatchewan⁴

- In Saskatchewan, 62 % of the province's 3,000 artists reside in Regina (960) or Saskatoon (875).
- Among the ten large cities on the Prairies, Regina has the highest artistic concentration, with 1.0 % of the local labour force in the arts. The artistic concentration in Regina is tied for tenth among large Canadian cities.
- Saskatoon has 0.8% of its local labour force in the arts occupations and ranks fifth of the ten large cities in the Prairies.
- Relative to overall labour force growth from 1991 to 2001, growth in the arts labour force was highest in Regina, over 43 times the growth in the overall local labour force.
- Saskatchewanians spent "\$740 million on cultural goods and services in 2005. This amounts to 3.5% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$740 million in consumer spending on culture is over three times larger than the \$210 million spent on culture in Saskatchewan by all levels of government in 2003/04. On a per capita basis, Saskatchewanians' cultural spending is the fourth highest among Canadian provinces at \$837 per resident."⁵

Examples of Canada Council funding in Saskatchewan⁶

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Saskatchewan.

Benjamin Schenstead received **\$3,000** from the **Grants to Professional Musicians (Individuals) - Classical Music of all World Cultures** program to attend and participate in the International Nürtingen Guitar Festival from August 4 to 12, 2006 in Germany. **Schenstead**, a Cree guitarist and composer from Saskatoon, not only performed at the festival but also attended concerts, workshops and communicated with various guitar builders and other guitarists from around the world. Of the experience, **Schenstead** wrote: "Playing in master classes for world-renowned musicians was encouraging and constructive, with many fine suggestions and comments given concerning my playing."

Regina's **Common Weal Community Arts** received a grant in the amount of **\$22,000** from the **Multidisciplinary ACCP - Artists and Community Collaboration Program** to present the multidisciplinary festival project ***Kikinaw: Our Home, a Multimedia Event*** from May 2-3, 2007 in Prince Albert. **Common Weal** invited artists working in a variety of media to facilitate workshops or programs with Prince Albert area youth and emerging artists throughout the year. This resulted in new collaborative performance and installation works that were presented at the festival. Through providing a forum for voice and social change, **Common Weal** encourages self-expression and creativity within the community of Prince Albert.

The **Travel Grants to Dance Professionals** program awarded **\$1,500** to **Jill Reid** of Elstow to present a paper at the Colouring Senses daCi (Dance and the Child) International Conference in the Netherlands from July 2 to 8, 2006. **Reid**, a first time grant applicant and recipient, presented ***Does the D in Dance Mean Delightful or Dysfunctional***, a paper regarding the North American phenomenon of dance competitions which she co-wrote with **Susan Fowler Kerry**, a professor in the College of Nursing at the University of Saskatchewan. **Reid** wrote: "During our presentation we were able to hold lively discussions... There was also much debate surrounding the negative aspects of competition."

The **Co-operative Projects in Writing and Publishing** program awarded **\$5,500** to Regina's **Saskatchewan Publishers Group (SPG)** to publish the ***Spirit of Saskatchewan*** catalogue. The catalogue will promote a greater awareness of Saskatchewan writers and publishing throughout the province. It will include almost 100 books written by Saskatchewan authors and will be available online, allowing for the yearly addition of new titles. Distribution of the publication will include all provincial schools. **SPG** writes that these "will have a powerful trickle-down effect for young readers, who would have at their disposal a user-friendly guide and resource for research."

Graeme Patterson of Woodrow traveled to Montreal to mount his multimedia installation entitled **WOODROW** at the Biennale de Montréal 2007 in May with a **\$1,000** grant from the **Travel Grants to Professional Artists** program. Montreal writer Stacey DeWolfe described the work as a “miniature village – a sculptural evocation of a small town in Saskatchewan – unaware of the magic that lurks beneath its faded grey exteriors.”⁷ Of the exhibition, **Patterson** wrote: “Due to the Biennale’s national and international recognition and the large scale of my installation, it will be the most significant exhibit of my career to date.”

Regina’s **Sâkêwêwak First Nations Artists' Collective** received **\$15,000** from the **Project Assistance to Visual Arts and Fine Craft Organizations** program to organize an international symposium entitled **TransPose: Shedding the Capacity to Fit In** which took place from February 25 to 27, 2007. The symposium brought together “artists, curators, academics and theorists representing both Aboriginal and culturally diverse communities in deep discussion about working within communities informed by histories and discourses outside the bounds of the traditional western European Art cannon.” **TransPose** also included an exhibition and presentation of the work of Canadian and international artists.

Leona Theis of Saskatoon won the **\$6,000** first prize in the **CBC Literary Awards** in creative non-fiction for her piece entitled **The Occupations of Muriel Thompson** in 2006-07. Of the piece, the CBC’s jury commented: “A beautifully crafted, mordantly comic, compassionate portrait of a woman who has spent her life at the typewriter, writing other people’s words.”⁸ **Theis** is the author of the *Sightlines* (2000) and *The Art of Salvage* (2006).

Regina’s **New Dance Horizons (NDH)** received **\$25,000** from the **Support for Creation-based Collaborations: Local, National and International Pilot Program** for a residency with choreographer and dance artist **Tedd Robinson** in 2006-07. **NDH** opened their 2006-07 season with the world premier of REDD, the solo work choreographed and performed by **Robinson**. During his residency **Robinson** gave two choreographic lecture/workshops, facilitated technique classes as part of **NDH**’s regular *Dance Core* program and engaged in discussion with audience members before and after the premier of REDD.

In 2006-07 the **Grants to Professional Writers - Creative Writing** program awarded **Brenda Schmidt** a **\$20,000** grant to develop a poetry manuscript entitled **Grid** that will explore what it means to be rural in an increasingly urban society. **Schmidt**’s poetry will investigate issues of displacement, connectivity, disconnection, exile and notions of home. Of the project, **Schmidt** wrote: “The narrative-lyric sequence and the attention to sound throughout this manuscript are elements that I wish to develop as I work on this project...I want to concentrate on musicality and the effects of using language to explore the contemporary rural experience.”

Composer **Alain Perron** of Regina received a **\$750** grant through the **Travel Grants to Professional Musicians** program to assist with the premiere of his work ***Land of Living Skies*** at the Haskell Opera House in Stanstead, Quebec on May 25, 2006. The 12-minute piece was performed by The Estria Woodwind Quintet of Quebec, along with five other compositions. **Perron** wrote that the interpretation of ***Land of Living*** went smoothly, and the work was received very warmly by the audience at the premiere performance. ***Land of Living Skies*** was also performed at the Museum of Science and Nature in Sherbrooke, Quebec, on May 28, 2006.

The Canada Council's **Assistance for the Promotion of Architecture** program awarded Regina's **MacKenzie Art Gallery** a grant of **\$18,000** to organize a series consisting of two travelling exhibitions and a three-day symposium called ***The Ordinary Amazing: The Cultural Value of Modernist Architecture***. The exhibitions include ***The Architecture of Clifford Wiens*** from May 26 to August 26, 2007 and ***41° to 66°: Regional Responses to Sustainable Architecture in Canada*** from March 31 to September 9, 2007. The keynote addresses at the symposium, which took place from May 26 to 28, 2007, were Patricia Patkau and Clifford Wiens both architects in Vancouver.

David Geiss of Regina was awarded a grant of **\$8,000** from the **Grants to Film and Video Artists** program to produce a medium length documentary entitled ***Stubblejumper*** in 2006-07. **Geiss**, a first-time grant recipient, will tell the story of Doug Wilson (1950-1992) "a gay activist from rural Saskatchewan who went on to become one of the more recognisable figures of the gay rights movement in Canada in the 1970s and 1980s." Of the film **Geiss** wrote: "Many elements will be intercut in scenes or 'chapters' that could stand alone, yet are compiled in a feature format: Interviews, archival elements and finally, 'dramatic' scenes using actors recreating characters and situations."

Saskatoon playwright **Mansel Robinson** received a **\$10,000** grant from the **Grants to Theatre Artists** program to complete writing ***Trigger Happy***, a full-length play from July 2006 to May 2007. ***Trigger Happy*** is a "social satire about gangsters, academia, public relations and a hit-man with Carpal Tunnel Syndrome in his gun hand. It's also about love and books and the truth." Themes that emerge from the play include "our fascination with violence in popular culture, our acceptance of corporate gangsterism and our acceptance of obvious religious hypocrisy." **Robinson** premiered the play and facilitated a workshop at the Saskatchewan Playwrights Centre Spring Festival in May 2007 in Saskatoon.

The **Art Gallery of Prince Albert (AGPA)** received a grant of **\$10,000** from the **Visual Arts - Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative** in 2006-07 for several projects, including the creation of an 'e-book' chronicling the life and achievements of **Wynona Mulcaster**. **Mulcaster** is "celebrated for her paintings of prairie landscapes reflecting the vitality and structure of the land and sky. 'Nomi' (as she is called by her friends) was born in Prince Albert in 1915 and has become one of the Canada's most accomplished painters." The 'e-book' will include an audio and video interview with **Mulcaster** and a retrospective of her works for online dissemination in both official languages.

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding to Saskatchewan by all three levels of government⁹

- Arts and culture funding to Saskatchewan from all three levels of government stood at \$206.3 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Provincial funding made up the largest share at 43% (\$87.7 million) with another 35% (\$72.9 million) coming from municipal sources. Federal funding made up the last share at 22% (\$45.8 million).
- Federal government cultural funding to Saskatchewan totalling \$45.8 million is primarily concentrated (80%) in two areas – broadcasting and heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks). The remaining 20% of funding (\$9 million) is allocated to areas including performing arts (\$2.9 million), film and video (\$2.1 million), multidisciplinary arts (\$1.3 million) and literary arts (\$1.0 million). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for about 7% of all federal culture spending in Saskatchewan.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in Saskatchewan increased from \$44 million to \$45.8 million (an increase of 5%). During the same period, Canada Council funding to Saskatchewan increased from \$2.5 million to \$3.1 million.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in four areas – heritage resources, libraries, film and video and broadcasting (85% or \$75 million). There funding is also allocated by the provincial government to multidisciplinary art (\$3.5 million), performing arts (\$3.1 million), visual arts and crafts (\$2.2 million), literary arts (\$1.4 million), multiculturalism (\$1.2 million) and other (\$1.2 million).

5.0 Detailed tables of Canada Council funding to Saskatchewan

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Saskatchewan

- Since 1999-00, Canada Council funding to Saskatchewan has increased, rising from \$2.5 million in 1999-00 to \$3.3 million in 2006-07 (an increase of 28.41%).
- In the past eight years, Saskatchewan's share of Canada Council grant funds has fluctuated between 2.32% and 2.79%. Saskatchewan's share in 2006-07 has decreased to 2.32%, the lowest percentage share in the past eight years.

Grant applications from Saskatchewan

- Since 1999-00 the total share of grant applications from Saskatchewan artists and arts organizations has varied between 1.77% and 2.18%. Saskatchewan's number of grant applications decreased from 314 in 1999-00 to 310 in 2006-07, a decrease of 1.27%. Saskatchewan's share of total grant applications was 1.98% in 2006-07, slightly lower than its share of artists (2.30%) and significantly below its share of population (3.06%) – See Table 7.

Saskatchewan – Various comparisons with other provinces¹⁰

- Saskatchewan ranks ninth in terms of its level of Canada Council funding on a per capita basis per province at \$3.37. In terms of its share of funding, Saskatchewan is in seventh place at 2.32%. Its share of funding is higher than its share of applications and its share of artists, but lower than the province's percentage share of population.
