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1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to the Northwest Territories in 2008-09

- In 2008-09, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling \$204,105 to the arts in the Northwest Territories.
- In addition to grants, \$5,217 in payments was provided to 12 authors through the Public Lending Right program in 2008-09. This brings the total amount of funding to the Northwest Territories to \$209,322.
- The Council distributed \$29,200 in funds to five artists and \$174,905 to seven Northwest Territories arts organizations in 2008-09.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in the Northwest Territories in media arts, music, visual arts, and writing and publishing, as well as through the Aboriginal Arts Secretariat. In 2008-09, the largest amount of funding went to media arts (\$41,000), followed by writing and publishing (\$40,905) and visual arts (\$35,200).
- 28 applications from Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations were submitted to Council in 2008-09, representing 0.2% of the total number of received applications.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Fort Simpson totalled \$108,000 comprising 52.9% of the total funding going to the Northwest Territories. In 2008-09, Yellowknife received \$78,605, representing 43.9% of total funding. A total of two additional communities received \$6,500 in funds (3.1%).
- In 2008-09, Northwest Territories artists received 0.1% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Northwest Territories arts organizations received 0.1% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations received 0.1% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the Northwest Territories makes up 0.13% of the total population of Canada,² and 0.13% of Canadian artists.³
- Three artists from the Northwest Territories served as peer assessors in 2008-09, comprising 0.4% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in the Northwest Territories⁴

- In 2006, there were 180 artists in the Northwest Territories, representing 0.71% of the overall territorial labour force.
- In 2006, the median earnings of artists in the Northwest Territories were \$20,100, one-half of the typical earnings of all provincial workers (\$40,000).
- In the Northwest Territories, the broader cultural sector has about 750 workers. That means that one in every 34 people in the territory has a cultural occupation.
- Over \$43 million was spent on culture by all levels of government in the Northwest Territories in 2006-07. Per capita cultural spending ranks first among provinces/territories in terms of the federal contribution (\$720) and second in terms of the provincial/territorial investment (\$231).

Examples of Canada Council funding in the Northwest Territories⁵

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in the Northwest Territories.

First-time grant applicant and recipient **Karen Zaidan** of Fort Smith, N.W.T., was awarded **\$1,500** through the **Travel Grants to Professional Musicians** program to take part in the **Banff's Advanced International Voice Workshop** with Richard Armstrong, in August 2008. The ten-day workshop allowed musicians to explore new voice techniques in an open and understanding environment, focusing on vocal range, breathing techniques and individual creativity. With an opportunity to explore new dimensions within themselves, musicians were inspired to continue learning, creating, and teaching music. **Zaidan** noted the workshop was an excellent opportunity to encounter musicians on an international scale, and this experience will no doubt lead to future collaborations.

The **Yellowknife Public Library (YLP)** received an **\$8,905** grant through the **Literary Readings and Festivals** program to assist the organization in hosting Canadian writers for a literary readings series in 2008-09. The only public library in Yellowknife, **YPL** is dedicated to bringing high quality and diverse artists to the Northwest Territories and exposing residents to the Canadian professional writing scene. During the literary series, authors such as Maxine Trottier, Dan Bar-El, and Julie Lawson were invited to share their work with local audiences through public readings, school visits, workshops, and bookselling events. The writers also visited libraries in Fort Smith, Hay River, and Fort Simpson as a means of making literature accessible to small and remote communities.

In 2008-09, **\$15,200** was granted to **Goota Ashoona** and **Joe Ashoona** of Yellowknife as part of the **Aboriginal Traditional Visual Art Forms Program** for individuals to create a whalebone carving program between Haida and Inuit carvers. As a multi-generational family who are greatly admired within the Aboriginal community, the **Ashoonas** promoted the program as a way to pay tribute to the strong artistic relationship between Inuit and Haida artists. The primary objective of the program was to establish an exchange of materials and resources between carving groups; however, the artists also taught school-aged Haida children Inuit carving techniques. The exchange was a unique opportunity for both groups to learn the artistic practices of another Aboriginal community.

Open Sky Creative Society, based in Fort Simpson, N.W.T., was awarded \$14,000 through the **Media Arts Project Grants** program to present two major media arts programming components at the **Open Sky Festival** in June 2009. The Society's programming will feature artists whose work focuses on the Dehcho arts community and will consist of a week-long new media installation exhibition, as well as a formal video and film screening. Organizers of the **Festival** hope the initiative will allow the Dehcho community to interact with local and national artists from across Canada, thus exposing them to new and potentially unfamiliar art forms.

Yellowknife's **Tanya Gillis** received a **\$5,000** grant through the **Music** section's **Career Development Program** to assist in contracting **Mainstage Management Inc** to carry out several important professional development projects from January to June 2009. Over a short period of time, **Gillis** has created a remarkable body of work, as she has recorded and performed alongside some of the most notable artists in contemporary music. Over the next year, the artist plans to attend performances, showcases and networking events in Canada, the United States, and abroad to continue building an international profile. By participating in such events, **Gillis** hopes to create new touring and publishing opportunities, as well as enhance her portfolio as an internationally-recognized musician.

A grant of \$7,000 was awarded to the Northern Arts & Cultural Centre (NACC) through the Spoken Word and Storytelling Program to present the fourth annual NACC Festival of Stories from May 30 to June 7, 2008 in Yellowknife. The NACC aims to encourage the development of performing arts from all cultural traditions and provide a venue in the N.W.T. for community and professional performances. Under the theme Objects in the Mirror are Closer than They Appear: Storytelling Road Festival, the Festival focused on the concept of journey as a unique story and featured storytellers from different Canadian regions and cultural backgrounds. For the storytellers and the audience, the event marked an important step towards enhancing spoken word in Northern Canada.

Shad Turner, a young choral conductor from Yellowknife, received **\$2,500** through the **Travel Grants to Professional Musicians** program to participate in the **Sarteano Choral Conducting Workshop** in Italy in August 2008. Over an eight-day period, the artists focused on strengthening the rehearsal and performance practices of music for chamber choirs, and presented their work in a community setting. For **Turner**, the workshop provided much-needed inspiration, programming ideas, and contacts for future collaboration projects – three elements critical to the success of choir conductors, especially for those in isolated regions. Most importantly, the program provided **Turner** with new insight into the importance of choirs within their communities, an aspect he hopes to apply to his work back home.

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in the Northwest Territories by all three levels of government⁶

- Arts and culture funding to the Northwest Territories from all three levels of government stood at \$43.4 million in 2006-07 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Federal funding made up the largest share at 72% (\$31.3 million) with another 23% (\$10.0 million) coming from provincial sources. The remaining 5% (\$2.0 million) of total government expenditures to the Northwest Territories came from municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to the Northwest Territories, totalling \$31.3 million, is primarily concentrated (98%) in two areas broadcasting and heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks). The remaining 2% of funding (\$630,000) is allocated to areas including film and video (\$106,000), literary arts (\$97,000) and multidisciplinary arts (\$259,000). In the comparable year (2006-07), Canada Council funding accounted for 1% of all federal cultural spending in the Northwest Territories.
- Between 2003-04 and 2006-07, federal cultural spending in the Northwest Territories increased from \$29.7 million to \$31.3 million (an increase of 5%). During the same period, Canada Council funding to the Northwest Territories increased from \$157,000 to \$214,045.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in three areas heritage resources, libraries, and multidisciplinary arts (98% or \$9.8 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to broadcasting (\$215,000).

Canada Council for the Arts funding to the Northwest Territories

- From 1999-00 to 2008-09, Canada Council funding to the Northwest Territories increased, rising from \$97,900 to \$204,105, a significant increase of 108.48%.
- Grants to the Northwest Territories as a percentage of total Canada Council funding increased slightly from 0.10% in 1999-00 to 0.14% in 2008-09.

Grant applications from the Northwest Territories

• Since 1999-00 the total number of grant applications from Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations has varied, ranging from 16 to 37. The Northwest Territories' percentage share of grant applications has varied between 0.10% and 0.23%. In 2008-09, the share of grant applications from the Northwest Territories to the Canada Council is slightly higher than both its share of population and share of artists – see Table 7.

• The Northwest Territories ranks sixth in terms of its level of Canada Council grant funding on a per capita basis per province at \$4.71. The Northwest Territories' share of grant funding is slightly lower than its percentage share of grant applications but is slightly higher than both its share of population and share of artists.
